Greetings from Virginia!

It was so good to receive this letter yesterday on my birthday. It was like a visit from all of you!

We've been in our house 8 months and like it very much...everything on 1 floor and the garage attached so that if it's pouring outside, I press my remote control garage door opener and we're inside, under cover.

The year 1990 didn't start off too good for Monica and me. On Jan. 2nd, Monica fell and hurt her knee - first time she ever hurt herself whenever she fell. This time she hit her knee on the door frame and really hurt - couldn't move her leg. I called 911, they took her in the ambulance to the hospital...X-rays showed no broken bones, but a bad contusion. She had to keep her leg raised and apply cold compresses and was given anti-inflammatory medication. She got around the house in a wheelchair, then a walker and then to her cane. When she got better, I developed a superficial phlebitis. I had to raise my leg, apply heat, take medication...was bedded down most of the time except for stores and church. The crazy thing about all this, is that the phlebitis kept travelling up my leg. Finally it stopped and now it is disappearing. I am also plagued with a heel spur which had me hopping around. I wore a plastic heel cup - but finally got an arch support with the heel sort of indented and that is great. Now I'm back walking..... Monica is now going to a physical therapist who has devoted her life to taking care of CPs, from childhood on...now she sees adults. We heard of her from a friend of a friend who was help greatly by her. He used to wear braces...now he does not, walks with only a slight limp. We went to see her, the woman, Charlotte, did some evaluation exercises

with Monica and said there is great potential for her. She'd like to get Monica out of the braces and heavy shoes. Around the house she is wearing sneakers (jogging shoes with flared heels) and she is doing pretty good with them. Just raising her feet to clear the floor (with the rubber soles) is exercise for her. So we go every Friday to Richmond (1¼ hr. drive) to the therapist and every week another kind of exercise is added -- all to lengthen and stretch her muscles especially in the hips and also learn to improve her posture and balance which was never right with Monica. She never used her body (esp. the trunk, hips) as she should have. So, we are hoping for improvement in Monica!

We've had visitors: Alan, Deanne and (?) back in September--Kitch and Dick (friends) Walsh back in November--Claire and Ed in March and this past weekend - a surprise visit from Alan, Deanne and Billy. Alan had a few vacation days and decided to visit Granny for her birthday - and Monica, too. They drove down Wednesday, stayed at Eric's house Wed. night and drove to my house the next day and stayed until Sunday after Mass and drove home. It was a great surprise for me, a real happy 3½ day visit with us. Billy now smiles when you talk to him or play "Clap Hands" with him. He is sort of learning to roll over - is teething - but didn't wake Granny or Aunt Monica any of the nights he was here. If we go to the family reunion in August, we'll probably see Billy with a few teeth (?) - he'll be sitting up - will roll over, maybe crawl, but always smile his ear to ear smile.

I forgot about Monica's eyes -- the cataracts are ripening. She has a visit to the eye dr. scheduled in August and she probably will have the operation this year yet.

To those of you who know my sister. Joan is in remission, is sure she is cured of the leukemia...and her hair has grown back in after the kemo treatments, only it grew in gray and she's not used to gray, so she colored it blond...she's used to being blond.

I'm still waiting for landscaping to be done around my property -- also for the part of the driveway that is not on my land to be cut off and then widen the other side of the driveway.

That's it for now -- everybody keep well, keep happy -- above all, keep in touch.

As Alan said, this is a very sad time for our family. Aunt Anna is now at Deepdale General Hospital, & my mother's last report (this morning) is that it will probably be all downhill from here. Mom & Aunt Claire are meeting with Mercy Hospital's hospice staff today, but no one really knows what the near future will hold. When I last visited "Auntie" on Monday, she said she knows we all love her & are praying for her, so that is the main thing. She also said loud & strong that we must never let the Round Robin stop. I assured her we couldn't, & am sending it off as fast as possible, for her.

We Zirkels are not doing extremely well at the moment either. Believe it or not, I am writing this in the lobby of Winthrop Univ. Hospital, where I am waiting while Bill has major surgery. He has been having intestinal problems for years, with occasional flareups of diverticulitis. This past month he had such a bad infection (abscess) that he was hospitalized for 10 days of intravenous antibiotics. He was home for 3 wks. But the one area of the intestines is so badly damaged that they are operating to remove it (about 6"-8") today. Hopefully he should be good as new in a few weeks, unless they have to do a temporary colostomy, which would complicate things & necessitate a second operation. These have been difficult weeks trying to juggle visiting Bill, taking care of the baby, & still attempting to keep my head above water at work. The farm looks great, & any of you who can make it should have a very nice visit. Of course, at all the upcoming family events we'll be thinking about "Auntie" & having her with us in spirit!

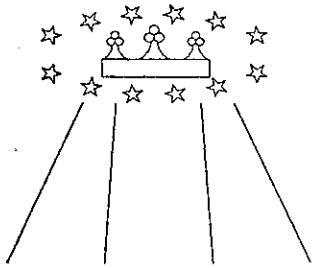
Dear All,
