Dear Family,

May 2, 2003

After a tumultuous 2002, this year has *thus far* been much more calm (is there such a thing with a 2 ½ and 5 year old?) for the Klein household. Last year was one that we wouldn't care to repeat any time soon! In February 2002 we sold our house in Charlotte and moved into an apartment in Raleigh while we were waiting for our new house to be built. Simultaneously, John's parents also decided to move up to Raleigh since his father retired and they no longer had any ties to Charlotte. It was bad enough that between February and July we started two new jobs (John at USF and me at UPS) and went through three major moves between our two and John's parents, but then things got even more *fun!* It was right after we moved into our new house in Wake Forest (a suburb of Raleigh) that we saw many of you at the family party. Dear Family,

Wow, the letter sure is taking a leisurely path through the Family! Waddya say, folks? Lets pick it up!

The sad news from us for this round is that we lost the furry member of our family. Muffin, our Shih Tsu, who was seventeen on November 5th, was put down on November 7th. She suffered from blindness (thanks in part to an attack by another dog two years ago), dementia and arthritis, but was otherwise in good condition. The expensive medication we were giving her for the dementia was losing its effectiveness, leading to prolonged, nightly fits of groaning, barking and literally bouncing off walls. The situation became unbearable, and the necessary decision was made.

Danie misses her role as Muffin's care giver and is struggling with the need to continue this role and the realization that another dog would not be another Muffin. (I'm hoping that the need will subside and that we won't have to get another pet.) However, recently, the care giver role was exercised by her parents as her father went through surgery for Dupuytren's Contracture. This is the same surgery Danie had two years ago. In her father's case, extension of the pinky on his left hand was limited to about 90 degrees from the palm. His ring finger was only slightly better. The surgery was successful, but the extension of his ring finger may still be limited because of arthritis.

Danie helped her parents by taking him to his doctor visits and therapy until he was cleared to drive himself. Why Danie had to make the 140 mile round trip five times in two weeks, when the next-door neighbors volunteered to take him (as Danie learned later) is beyond me. Danie's mother definitely knows how to push her buttons!

Danie continues to focus on her quilting and has now joined several guilds and sewing circles (I think it's really a front for sessions of drinking and carousing). We took a short vacation in March to attend a quilt show in Pigeon Forge, TN. We spent several days in Gatlinburg and visiting the Smokey Mountains National Forest in addition to attending the show.

Chris resigned his job at Panera Bread several months ago to stay at home and work on the freelance graphic design jobs that he managed to round up, oddly, through contacts he made while working at Panera. One of his clients was Friends Association for Children, the organization that Stephanie Cunningham works(ed?) for. He prepared an annual report for the organization, which they were reportedly very pleased with. His freelance work has managed to bring in a little less money as he has been making at Panera, but he was working in his chosen profession, making contacts and building a portfolio. When bills got to be too high, he sought employment through a Temp agency and was put to work at Bank of America where he assembles loan application packages for the loan officers to process.

In February, the two roommates in his apartment decided to move on with their lives; one is getting married, the other wants to move closer to where he works. That would have left Chris without roommates and without any chance of making the rent, so, once again the doors to the May Boarding House were opened and he moved back home in March.

He is now close to receiving an offer to work at an advertising firm here in Richmond. He responded to an add that the firm had placed and was called in for several interviews. It seems like they were really looking for a gofer, but once Chris showed them what he could do, they want him. But now they must reconsider what his responsibilities (and pay?) would be. The wait is killing ME!

Claudine is back at home with us after graduation from Radford and was working at Lerner as a sales clerk. After we finally convinced her that she was far too good (and too well educated, at my expense) to be working as a sales clerk, she put in her two week notice and was beginning to look for other employment. Three days after putting in her notice, she was contacted by the Costume Shop Director at the New Harmony Theatre in Evansville, IN (where she had worked three years ago during the summer). The Director was in need of a first hand at the shop and she took a chance calling Claudine to see if she was available. Well, of course she was! She'll be heading out to Indiana on May 17th and returning around August 26th. After that . . . ?????? One week before she took off for Indiana, she received a phone call from the Red Barn Playhouse, where she was supposed to work last year. Seems like they've resolved the legal issues with the treater and are planning a full summer schedule and they need help. Too late! Too bad!!

I'm doing the same stuff as usual . . . work, of course (more later), involvement in the K of C, including the Fourth Degree, some involvement with St. Mikes Church and a perennial member of the homeowners association board. Danie & I joined the K of C mixed bowling league this year to occupy out Thursday nights. (Unfortunately, bowling starts at 9:00 pm, which is, of course, after my bedtime.). In our team's first season, we struggled to maintain a firm grasp on last place, but as the season progressed, we were resigned to the fact that we would finish eleventh out of twelve positions. However, in the end, we really messed up and took tenth spot on the last night of the year. We got Claudine to sign up as a sub and during the latter part of the season, she became a favorite because of her good, fun-loving nature. She was particularly favored by teams on which a mothers and their adult sons played. (Some attempt at match-making??)

We got a late start, but it looks like I'll be playing softball again this year with the St. Mike's Defenders Coed Church League team, if the back holds out.

The new worship space at St. Michael's Church is now open, following dedication of the facilities in September. The new space is an in-the-round type, with the altar right in the middle. A curious choice of the building committee was the use of stadium seating around a sunken altar rather than flat seating with a raised altar. The stadium seating results in a clear view of everything that is going on on the opposite side of the church and, unfortunately, there is far too much "stuff" going on during Mass these days (It's unbelievable what parents are letting their kids get away with these days! But then, some of their behaviors aren't much better!)

Regarding the allegations of sexual impropriety that were made against our pastor last year, all the clamor has gone away. The only open issue last year was a complaint made to a county Commonwealth's Attorney. While there were no public statements about the case, it appears that the Commonwealth's Attorney came to the expected conclusion . . . that the accusation was unsubstantiated.

We unwittingly were apparently very close to the Washington area sniper that had been so much in the news in September and October.

The shooting that took place at the Ponderosa Restaurant on Rte 54 in Ashland was very close to Chris' apartment. As it happened, we were in Ashland that night attending yet another performance by our favorite singer/songwriter, Susan Greenbaum (*whose third CD, "Hey, Hey, Hey!" was released in September and is now available at www.susangreenbaum.com . . . uh, sorry! We just love this young lady!!*). Anyway, we passed the Ponderosa at about 6:15 or about 1½ hours before the shooting. The coffee shop where Susan performs is located right on Rte 54 about a quarter mile from Rte 1 (where Chris' Apartment was) which is in turn ½ mile from the Ponderosa. We found out about the shooting during a break in the performance just before Chris & Claudine arrived at the coffee shop to check in with us. They had intended to catch a movie at a nearby theatre, but the area was closed down following the shooting. After we were all satisfied that we knew one-another's plans, the kids took off for Chris' apartment. After seeing a picture of one of the alleged shooters, John Mohammad, after his capture, Danie swears that he came into the coffee shop during the break, got a cup of coffee and left (Quite possible, since we now know he hung around the area for some time after the shooting.)

At work, things have been really hopping. North Anna Unit 2 shut down last October for a routine refueling outage that was expected to take 33 days. During that outage, we conducted inspections of the reactor vessel head to determine the extent of potential cracking of tubes that penetrate the head. Cracking of the tubes had been experienced in French nuclear plants beginning ten years ago. While the French have been proactively replacing their reactor heads with an improved design, American plant owners have been very fragmented in their response to the issue. When one plant, Davis Besse in OH shut down and found a football sized cavity that had been eroded / corroded away because of a leak caused by a tube crack, the situation became very serious. The inspection of the North Anna Unit 2 head revealed "crack-like" indications on most of the penetration tubes (but certainly no significant leaks or "wastage" of the head itself). Faced with a very costly repair of the head, we began to search for options and found out, literally by accident, that the French company Framatome had three reactor heads very similar to ours in their warehouse (Intended for use at three Spanish plants that could not afford them). Thus and therefore started an immense project to adapt those heads for our plants and devise a way of getting the old heads out and new ones in. In the next three months, the first reactor head was adapted to make up for the small differences in design, the overall design of the head was checked against our requirements, a large hole was cut into the four-foot-thick concrete containment building, the first head was flown from France to Richmond and trucked to the site, where it arrived just as the old head was being taken out, the new head was installed, the hole in the concrete was repaired and the unit was returned to power. It was a miracle! Since then, we have similarly replaced the head on North Anna Unit 1 during a 55 day outage and are in the middle of doing the same at Surry Unit 1. Surry Unit 2 will have its head replaced with one specifically manufactured for it in the Fall. What a year this will be for our nuclear program! But when it's done, we'll be the first American nuclear utility to put the reactor head issue behind us.

That's it! I hope I'm not being too verbose (I used up 1½ pages!)

Greetings from Williamsburg, VA

7/11/03

I got the RR last October - 9 months... it could go much faster!!!

Monica and I still have our health problems. I'm biding my time re. having a hip replacement - since a spine operation is out of the question as I wrote last time. I am secretary/treasurer for the Summer Bowling League which ends Aug. 5. - I will then make an appointment to see the orthopedic doctor.

Monica's right leg was red and swollen and a podiatrist suggested she go for lymphedema treatments. She had the treatments for the time allowed by Medicare - but her leg swelled up again. It was thought that she had cellulitis again (she had it several years ago). She was hospitalized for 5 days, with complete bed rest, during which time her legs slimmed down and tests showed no evidence that it was cellulitis: she did not have a fever nor did her white blood cell count rise so the doctor decided the swelling is from premarin, the medication she has been taking since she had a hysterectomy and a side effect from premarin is swelling of the legs. So she is being weaned off that. So far, so good. Her legs are still normal - no more lymphedema treatments - she is wearing compression hose (knee high).

Never are we trouble-free..... She was going into the kitchen in her wheelchair and the small front wheel collapsed. The company from whom we got the wheelchair said it is beyond repair. They gave us a loaner - and we are to pay rental of the chair until she gets a new wheelchair in a month or so. She is getting a new wheelchair because therapists noted that Monica needs a deeper seat and to get one, it has to be custom-made. (The old wheelchair has a seat depth of 16" and the custom-made one will be 20" - she has long upper leg bones. And she had a choice of a color for the new chair - she chose: razzleberry (a dark red (maroon) or purple color).


Eric wrote about his new church. We, too, have a new church - seats 1500. It is the largest church in the state of Virginia. We have a large number of parishioners... over 2500 families, and growing... and we get a large number of tourists... so we need a large church. It took a long time - since 1996 we've had committees working on it. Finally, on May 31st, 2003 the church was dedicated by our bishop. Now all Masses are in the new church - no more Masses in the old church or the parish center... and we now have 'One Table'. We used to have 2 Masses on Saturday evening, and 5 Masses on Sunday with another at 5 p.m. for the William and Mary College students, at which time many regular parishioners attended. Now we have a 5:30 Mass Saturday and a 7:15, 9 and 11 a.m. and a 5 p.m. Mass Sunday when college was in session. At the new site we do not have enough parking spaces. We have 335 parking spaces and need more. The land, 43 acres, was donated by a family who have been long time parishioners. We have extra land for making another parking lot (when it is said we have \$175,000 available to pave another parking area). We can expand the church in time, if it is necessary, or erect another building (?) for offices and somewhere on the land a Rectory. They are in the midst of selling the rectory across the street from the old church. I did not mention the new church is about 4 miles from the old church. Right now the priests have to drive to 'work' and all but 4 of the offices are still in the parish center. So far, things are going well with me... i.e. finding a parking space close to the church. Of course, they have handicapped spaces - in fact, they say they have more than the required number of handicapped spaces. Handicapped spaces are doubled on the weekends and they say they will make additional handicapped spaces if it is deemed necessary. ... and I believe that time won't be far off - we have a lot of older and handicapped people. I park as close to the church as I can get and walking more than I did to get into the old church or parish center. I use my walker going to the new church. Walking from my car to the door of the handicapped entrance is longer than the old church - much longer. When you get to the door of the church you walk into the Commons Area, which is 170 feet wide - walk halfway through that (85') and then a walk through the connecting area (where the baptismal font is - boy what a size that is! - huge!) and only then do you walk into the worship area. They do have some pews made shorter in the group of 8 sections to accommodate the wheelchairs, walkers and those who do not kneel. Another thing Eric wrote that the altar in his new church is down... our new church has an altar set up higher - about 4 steps up from the floor. I will have more about the new church next time around. I hope it is not boring to you.

I'm happy to announce that Chris did get the job that Eric wrote about - it took the company a while to decide to hire Chris as a regular graphic arts designer not a gofer as the ad was about. At last he has a job in the field he wants and likes.

I'm glad to read all good things are happening with the May Family. Sorry to hear about you, Steve, separated from Gina. It is so good to read of all the things happening: marriages, babies, schooling, jobs, etc. - everybody doing pretty well. Keep the RR going around as fast as you can.

Dear Family,

9/16/03

We received this just after the anniversary of 9/11/01. It was an oddly "normal" day, even here in the neighborhood of Ground Zero. Unfortunately, what constitutes "normal" has changed dramatically. There is the constant fully armed military and police presence in the area, along with multiple roadblocks on every street leading to the area of the Stock Exchange. Walking from the subway to my building at 60 Wall is an obstacle course!

The WTC site itself was amazing on 9/11 due to the remarkable quiet in the crowds there. Everyone seemed to be reading the history posters, the details of what happened 9/11/01 and the memorials, with very little talking. It was quite a scene.

As you can see above I am back on Wall St with Deutsche Bank. We bought this building in Aug 01 from JP Morgan/Chase to be our new headquarters, replacing our smaller building in Midtown. When the building at 130 Liberty St (across from the WTC) was damaged beyond repair by the collapse of WTC2, we were rerouted to Piscataway NJ, then Midtown, now here. Originally, the thought was to never again have all our people in one place (keep midtown & downtown sites), but now we're all here. While the Bank totes its support for rebuilding downtown, we realize that all the tax breaks had more to do with the decision, and the employees pay for it. I've switched positions several times in the past year with restructuring. So far, I've avoided the "rightsizing" cost-controlling efforts of the Bank. It is taxing working in such an uncertain environment.

I've started my second year as scoutmaster for Bill's troop. It's a challenge to create an atmosphere where the boys can run the weekly program rather than running it myself, as I did last year. Live and learn. We've added 4 more boys from 2 Cub packs, and have several more in the pike, so we are ensured a good size troop for a few years. And it looks like I'll have a few more Dads to assist as well, which makes it all easier.

Deanne continues p/t work at Mercy, tutoring learning disabled students and selling Fuller Brush, plus odd jobs on the side. She'll be starting a Brownie troop for Shannon and friends in her spare time. Scouting is a big part of our family time budget! She's also President of the Parish Council, Religious Ed teacher (she is Bill's 8th grade teacher!) and (with me) coordinates the Children's Liturgy at Sacred Heart.

Bill is in 8th grade and continues to thrive in the advanced program at Museum Middle School. We have to go through the High School shopping ordeal soon. Probably he will be at one of the diocesan High Schools in Westchester, but we don't know which one. Wherever he is, he will thrive! He gets to know all the teachers and staff and everything that is going on. He's amazing. He's also passing 5' 9" tall at 13 ½ years. He'll soon make first class in the Scout troop, and will celebrate Confirmation this year. There's no stopping him from achieving what he sets his mind to.
