

Electric power has been restored to 1.8 million Dominion customers who lost it (some for as long as 2½ weeks) and water was flowing again in Richmond metro area 1½ days after Isabel's departure to the north. But so many trees, whose root systems could not maintain grip in the saturated soil (thanks to an incredibly rainy summer) were felled by the gusty winds, that their removal will continue on into spring of next year. There will be no shortage of mulch and firewood in the coming years in this area!

Since the letter was here last, Danie & I took a summer trip to see the state of Michigan. Why Michigan, you ask? . . . Well, for the same reason that Barbara visited Kentucky/Tennessee . . . Why not? As it happened, we were just outside the area affected by the "Great Blackout of '03". That replacement was completed, and we are now coming to the end of the final head replacement outage for the Virginia plants; this one on Surry Unit 2. Our assimilation of the Millstone Power Station is going well and last week, it was announced that we have agreed to purchase the Kewaunee Power Station (a single unit site) in Wisconsin (About 100 miles north of Frank's digs). We'll take over the plant only after their next refueling outage where they will install a new reactor head and make changes to uprate the electrical output of the station.

I want to thank everyone who responded to my request to vote over the Internet for our favorite local singer/songwriter, Susan Greenbaum. Because of the overwhelming number of votes she received, Susan won the national contest sponsored by pop/rock star Jewel's Soul City Café and, as the winner, was *supposed* to tour with Jewel this Fall. Unfortunately, the tour never happened. Using the untimely death of Jewel's bass guitarist as an excuse, the tour was greatly scaled back and Susan was cut from the show with a "promise" to include her in a later tour. There is some good news here, however, as winning this nationwide contest has given Susan greater credibility, which caught the attention of one influential talent management firm (the firm that represents Barry Manilow). That firm is now doing some speculative (free) work to promote Susan, because they see a future in her. We're keeping our fingers crossed!

I want to get some feedback on a plan that Ray and I are working on, that we think would be something that our family would treasure. Aunt Claire has forwarded all of the original pages of the Round Robin (both the first chain, which was lost, and the current chain) and I plan to electronically scan all those pages. Our intent is to post these files on a Web site that Ray will maintain, so that at any time, anyone with internet access can review any part of the Round Robin archives. This time it took the Round Robin 5 months to get back to me... that's more like it! Keep up the good work!
Monica and I still have our health problems. I finally saw the orthopedic doctor. He took x-rays of my hips and compared them with ones he took 3 years ago. Quite unbelievable - I have more cartilage in my joints now. We believe that is because I've been taking Glucosamine/Chondroitin tablets. He suggested I get Synvisc injections in my knee to see if that helps my knee which is feeling the brunt of my scoliosis and weight. I just finished having the injections which consists of 3 injections - one a week over a three week period. I go back to the orthopedic doctor in two months and see how things are and decide on what should be done then. I am also planning to go back to the chiropractor - I think he'll be able to help me again, I hope!

Monica is finally accepted for Medicaid - but only for personal home health care. The rest of Medicaid: financial help with medications and handicapped transportation should follow shortly. We are really waiting for that. Her medications cost so much - and having someone take Monica to the doctor, or any other appointments, will help me - I won't have to take her. We are waiting for a healthcare provider to call and set up a program of days and hours for someone to come into the house and help Monica. I hope we'll like all this. I think it will take some getting used to, on my part, to have someone else in my house. We shall see!

Re. Isabel: We were without electricity for three days: from Thursday afternoon to Sunday afternoon. Our neighbor's tree fell between our houses but brushed up against mine. Roof tiles were ripped off, with the fascia and soffit. Also siding was damaged, either bending or bellying up the shingles on the side and front of the house at the garage area. The insurance adjuster came and gave me figures for fixing up the house. The trees, limbs, etc. was taken care of immediately by my neighbor, friends, etc. - but I had a rough time to finally get a roofing/siding company to come and see what has to be done. It turns out that the roofing shingles and siding are no longer available. My house is aluminum shingles and my neighborhood, in its by-laws, does not allow aluminum (I must have gotten in just before they made that rule). The aluminum shingles are not made anymore... the company is out of business. The roofing, too, cannot be matched... so the man said I could get a new house, i.e., all new siding and roofing. That would be something, wouldn't it? I'm waiting to hear from the insurance company. I will surely let you know.


More about my new church. We had 7 Masses (4 on the eve and 3 on Christmas day) Our church seats 1500 people. They have chairs that can be placed around which they did for the 4:30 p.m. Mass I attended - and people were standing out in the Commons area. I heard 2 different totals for attendance at this Mass: 1 usher said at least 1700 and another said 2,000. Getting out of the parking lots was trying on people's patience. I live sort of 'around the corner' from the church and it ordinarily takes me 5 minutes to get there - it took me at least 25 minutes Christmas eve to get from parking space at church to home. We still need more parking spaces, but I hear we do not have all the money needed to make equal parking lots on the other side of the church. I guess I should have stated that our church is set way back on the lot - it cannot be seen from the road. One good thing is that the drivers are being courteous letting cars alternately merge and finally getting into the road out that leads to the main road. Looking to the future - I was at a meeting the other morning and it is being said that all Easter Masses will be in the new church - not in William and Mary Hall, as it has been for years. We always have so many tourists. We will need more Masses - but our pastor wants to have the Masses in the new church... I agree.

On Christmas Day, Eric, Danie and Chris came for lunch which Danie made (a casserole). Of course, little Sophie, their 6 month old Shih Tzu, came along too. Claudine is in Vermont, but will be home January 6th for 6 weeks - time off from plays, etc. They stayed for about 5 hours and then went to Danie's parents for dinner. We had a great time. We called the Yonkers Mays, spoke with Alan, Deanne, Shannon and Gillian. I don't know where Billy was. They are all fine. It was snowing there - we had sunshine.

I'm glad to read all good things are happening with the May Family. I think Monica and I are going to go through each family and write down who got married to whom and if they have children, etc. and hopefully get names straight. We get confused, and we don't often get confused (!?!). Keep the RR going around as fast as you can. All keep happy and healthy. We are hoping and praying the New Year will be a good year for all.

Dear Family,

I have been looking at the family letters that have been scanned into the May family website. It's very interesting to see what we were all doing years ago and to see letters from Nana and Uncle Charlie. Some are doing almost the same things we were 18 years ago, and others have changed addresses and jobs numerous times. I did get the feeling that "what goes around comes around" because some of us cousins who were writing about school-age kids and their activities years ago are now writing about trips and grandbabies, while others who were writing about trips or babies are now writing about school-age kids and their activities.

Not a lot has changed here since the last time I wrote. My last letter was in September, and we were spending all our time at soccer games. Now it is May, so we are spending all of our time at baseball or softball games. It's just supposed to be an opportunity to get the kids from the three middle schools together for the first time, but over the years the kids have come to see it as a mini-prom. The parents I know think it's too much, too soon, but there seem to be lots of others who bought their daughters formals and took them out to get their hair done. I'm just glad that Brian had a good time and I'm glad that he didn't have to get his hair done.

My youngest, Colin, is in second grade this year, so there are no big changes in store for him and no dances! He's still happy most of the time and doing well at school, as far as I can tell. (He gets S for strong or P for progressing, which are the best letters). I see a lot of Colin and Emily at their school this year because I have increased the amount of time I volunteer there quite a bit, in addition to helping out more at church with REC (same thing as CCD). As was pointed out by someone, it is interesting to see not only everyone else's comments in the RR, but also the last entry that we made ourselves. My comments about the Wall St area remain the same – more permanent obstacles have been put in place, making even foot traffic troublesome. If we ever had to evacuate the area again, we'd have trouble. DB's old building was finally condemned, so it should be razed soon. It would be good not to see it any more.

On a brighter note, we are all doing well.

I remain with Deutsche Bank, but have been looking around, both internally and externally. The job market in Financial Services seems to be a little better, but I have to find a job where my background would fit. I keep trying. I'm still scoutmaster for Bill's troop and am learning things every week. We're setting up next year's program – a good chance to use the lessons learned over the last year (*mostly by making mistakes*). They say volunteering for scouts requires "one hour a week". It's more like one hour per day! The hope is that it pays off for the boys under my care. I'll probably never see the results of our efforts. I recently had the same hernia repaired for the third time (right inguinal). The surgeon this time had to remove a lot of dead tissue, nerves and blood vessels, which left some numbness. But I'm functional again, and hope this is the last surgery – at least for a hernia. There's also some concern about my liver, as I have fibroids. I'm not clear on what it all means, but it's not a good condition to have. Each doctor who observes my blood tests looks at me wryly when I say I do not (nor have I ever) drunk excessive alcohol.
