Dear Family,

Lots goin' on here in Central VA! First, and foremost, the letter arrived on my last day of employment with Dominion. While I was on vacation since the beginning of April, I held on to my company laptop, and periodically checked in to see how things were going (especially concerned for the employee who was named as the temporary supervisor). On April 30, I went back to the office to return the computer, pager and badge, and say my 'final' goodbyes to multitudes of co-workers. As of 1201 this morning, my electronic ID ceased to exist, and I am just a memory. I will go in as a visitor one day next week to meet with my newly named replacement for a little turnover. I am now to be counted among the ranks of the Retirees! (Went to my first Retirees' Mass / Luncheon at the K of C hall.)

After several rounds on the latest chemo drug (injections in the belly), **Mom's** hemoglobin count rebounded to 10.4 in April, however, while her Waldenstrom's numbers have been continuously trending down (good) her hemoglobin count has been inconsistent. This led to concerns that she is losing blood, and in fact, blood was found in her stool. So, at 88, with severe arthritis and scoliosis, she is going to undergo a colonoscopy and upper endoscopy in mid-May. Details to follow. In the meantime, she will take a break from the chemo injections, and continue to be monitored.

As Mom noted in her entry, **Monica**, is now scooting around the nursing home again, as the power chair is once again working. The batteries have not yet been replaced, so her trips are short, but she is still getting around. I have not had many opportunities to visit her lately (will visit more frequently in the future), so I have not instructed her about getting on the internet, and no progress has been made with respect to Facebooking or emailing.

Danie remains busy and stressed taking care of her Father (at least, she is now relieved of having to take Mom with her doctors' appointments). He required a replacement pacemaker (found out during the replacement, that without it, his heart would not only be arrhythmic, but it would stop), has experienced bouts with skin irritations (maybe because he uses bug spray like a room freshener??) cellulites, and other maladies that affect 86 year olds. Danie continues to participate in quilting guild meetings and events. She has made progress on a number of projects that have been started in past months / years, finishing many of them. She has been helping to set up a "Dear Jane" quilt exhibit by one of her guilds, that is being displayed at the Quilting museum in Harrisonburg, VA in early May. One of her own works is being displayed.

Claudine & Laughton are doing well, and their jobs are stable. Claudine has continued to handle more and more responsibilities, at Fahrenheit IT and was recently promoted to the account manager for Capital One in Virginia.

They will be celebrating Laughton's 40th birthday (early) mid-May as they take a 1 1/2 week trip to Ireland.

Chris & Kristy are also doing well, having just passed their six year anniversary. They have completed the first freelance project that they have been working on together outside of their regular jobs, and are on standby to being given additional work in the future.

While we took a break from **bowling** for the 2014/2015 season, we continued to meet up with our former teammates at Friendly's each week. We were horrified when, on the first bowling night after Christmas break, we drove to Friendly's and found it dark. A note on the door simply said, "Thanks for your patronage for the last 30 years . . . visit our other Friendly's at . . ." (20 miles away). Probably the worst part is that the waitress who has served us since we moved to Richmond (27 years ago!), who we know only as "Carol", has disappeared. We never said goodbye and we have no idea how to find her.

As for **Getaways**, there haven't been any since my last writing. While I was off for two weeks at the end of last year, three trips to Williamsburg (including one to bring Mom to see Monica), the holiday activities, and phone calls galore from work (dealing with the shutdown of North Anna Unit 1 because of a piping leak), ate up all of our time and prevented any impromptu day trips. As planned, I took all of my vacation (1 week carryover from last year and three weeks earned in the first two quarters of 2015) to take most of the month of April off. That time was spent getting acclimated to being home all of the time, and to start on the projects that we have planned for retirement. So far, I have made three trips to Goodwill, and multiple trips to the dump for the (very) initial efforts to clean out the garage. Mom had three doctor appointments that I had to take her to, and, of course, Danie had a similar number to take her father to. We have, however, combined two of those doctor visit trips to Williamsburg with visits to Colonial Williamsburg (got VA residents passes for unlimited visits this year). Additionally, we've been to Richmond International Raceway for the NASCAR Xfinity series race, and to Lewis Ginter Botanical Gardens (became members, so we can visit at will) and will visit the Virginia Museum of Fine Arts in the near future. I am planning a road trip for about 1 1/2 weeks in mid-June to the Northeast, and we are looking ahead to a return to Alaska in August, when we will take a land tour / cruise starting from Calgary, CN and ending at Anchorage, AK. We have already booked an Eastern Caribbean cruise in February 2016 with Ed & Janet Ebert.

July 17, 2015

Monica is still waiting for her power chair to get a new battery. I don't know exactly why it is, but they are waiting for an okay from Social Services in James City County for the money to be dispersed to Monica for the battery. It is still holding a sufficient charge to take her where she wants to go around the facility, as long as she doesn't make any side trips.

And me - I'm on another vacation from chemotherapy. My hemoglobin has been fine for the past months so I didn't have to go into the cancer center and get an injection 2X a week. July 30th is the next appointment with the hematologist and see how my hemoglobin is and find out if I go for more injections. It would be so nice if all is okay and I continue to be 'on vacation' from trips to the doctor's office. I'd just rather not do it.

On June 1, I fell getting up from my recliner, as I was getting dressed. I was unhurt, but in pain for days afterward. My right foot, and the big toe in particular got caught somehow and I now have a wound on the outside surface of my right big toe. I went to the podiatrist and she cut away some bruised skin and she calls it an ulcer - and I had to have my toe cleaned, Bacitracin and a bandage applied every day - and they woke me up every morning around 5:30 - 6:30 to do this. At today's follow-up visit to the podiatrist, the ulcer was declared healed.

We remember, especially Michelle, in our prayers - remember to pray for us.
